News from the Chief *Ruairidh MacLennan*

We are still recovering from a rather hectic Christmas / New Year period which was fun. Kirsteen, Lorna and myself were home most of the holidays which was nice. The last week has seen a lot of storms and floods, our cellar flooded a little bit but didn't cause any damage. It is just something that we have to live with, just as well we have a cellar! I really must get out with my digital camera and e-mail some photographs across to you.

Both the girls are well, busy with work and boyfriends and I have settled well into the new job and life at home. Life seems to be less hectic and I am making good progress with work on the house. It has taken quite a while to settle down as I have been trying to do too many jobs at once. I'm starting to get the DIY out of my system and am taking a bit more time over jobs.

My diary for this year is starting to come together and I had meant to get in touch with you to discuss plans for Canada soon. I have

looked at TA commitments as well as work restrictions and realistically think that I will only manage to make one of the Games, most probably Fergus. I am happy to commit to whatever schedule you want me to do, obviously the Games and any other activities that you want to organise. It would be lovely to manage a short trip if time permits but I

understand that time will be the main restraint.

Please let me know your thoughts on this, it's a pity that I cannot manage Maxville but work would not allow me to be away for such a long time a couple of weeks after being away for 2 weeks with the TA, plus it would use up my entire annual holiday entitlement!

I have become involved in the Community Council for South Side of Loch Ness and have been given a computer and allowance for internet connection which works out quiet well. In 1645 on May 9th, King Charles' representative, the Marquis of Montrose, confronted an army of Covenanters led by Sir John Urray, near a village named Auldearn in Scotland. Rain was falling as the battle commenced and among the 3,500 foot and 400 horse assembled under Urray's command, was Ruairidh MacLain Domhnull Bhain MacLennan, Chief of the Clan, defending the standard of Lord Seaforth. A tall, rugged, red-bearded highlander, he fought savagely and desperately in the ensuing clash, during which Urray's forces were slowly overwhelmed by a flanking movement of the Gordon Cavalry.

Ruairidh and his two brothers were ultimately killed along with many more MacLennans in that segment of the battle. For the next 330 years, the Clan had no official Chief. During 250 of those years, due to pressures political and financial, many remaining Clansmen and their descendants were forced or chose to leave Scotland to seek survival in newly discovered lands. Many septs with names distorted by usage or altered for practical purposes have resulted.

In 1969, Ronald George MacLennan declared his intention to claim the position of Chief. Due to the tireless energy of this vital, proud Scot, the Clan recognized his right to the position. Thirty years of tenacious searches and researches were rewarded with the Matriculation of Arms - the acknowledgment of the Lord Lyon, King of Arms of Scotland - and his installation as Chief of the MacLennan Clan at a ceremony in Inverness in 1978, which was the first such ceremony to be performed for at least two centuries.

In 1989, Chief Ronald died of leukemia, and his 12-year-old son, Ruairidh Donald George MacLennan inherited the title to be the Chief of the MacLennan Clan, becoming the youngest Clan Chief in the world. Ruairidh, quietly proud of his heritage, knew throughout his childhood that he would be Chief one day and he is handling the position with dignity and due gravity.

The Chief's Coat of Arms, with the motto "Dum Spiro Spero" includes two pipers, because like the MacCrimmons, the Clan is noted for its piping. Ruairidh is a very proficient piper and was Pipe Major of the Pipe Band at Fettes College in Edinburgh. Early in 1995 he won the Scottish Schools Piping Competition. He is also a competent rower and sailor, sailing on a Tall Ship from the south of England to Ireland and Scotland as part of his school curriculum. During the summer of 1993 he, with others, did a solo row the length of Loch Ness for Scottish charities. In 2002 Ruairidh graduated from the University of Aberdeen with a Master of Rural Surveying Degree, and was re-commissioned into the Officer Training Corps at Aberdeen as a Piper in their Pipe Band.

Our Chief Ruairidh's home is on the shore of Loch Ness in the village of Dores, approximately 10 miles from Inverness. He is currently employed by Strutt & Parker at Banchory, in the northeast of Scotland close to Aberdeen, and he is currently involved with the factoring of a number of estates.

Dr. John Edgar McLennan M.D.

Born February 7, 1922 in Oak Park, Illinois, passed away on August 10, 2004 in Sparks, Reno, Nevada.

He enlisted in the navy in 1942, served as Naval Aviator with the rank of Lt. Commander in Pacific Campaigns. In 1946 he enrolled in University of Illinois Medical School in Chicago graduating in 1950, Internship was served at Los Angeles County General Hospital. He opened his Private Medical Practice in Palo Verdes, California. He and his wife, Barbara moved to Reno, in September 1983 where he continued his medical practice. He became a Senior Medical Examiner for the F.A.A. and had served in that capacity till his final day. Dr. John is survived by his wife, Barbara and children Jon G. McLennan, M.D., James C. He was particularly helpful to our late Chieftain Bill (Greg's father) and our NSW & ACT Association, as well as the setting up of the Clan MacLennan Association in Scotland and later the World Federation of Clan MacLennan

Associations.

Our sincere condolences have been sent to his family on our Clan Association's behalf.

Bob served on the committee for ten years and was largely responsible for holding the Central Ontario Branch together through those early years. He resigned from the COB many years ago. After Bob's passing, Elizabeth sent a card on the Clan's behalf at the time and recently was in touch with the son of a late cousin of Betty's. Betty (Barbera Elizabeth) had spent the last few years in a long term care home failing from Alzheimers Disease.

Betty passed away November 4th, 2004. Bob and Betty had no children and the funerals were private.

Ruth Catherine MacLennan

The following was sent in by Jean Rose (Peterborough) with the approval of her family: Ruth Catherine MacLennan, affectionately known as Mac, died peacefully on February 12th, 2005 at the Veteran's Wing of Sunnybrook Hospital, in her 91st year. After graduating nursing at Toronto General at age 25, she went directly into service. She was a Nursing Sister in WWII and received six medals including the Defense Medal, Star-1939-1945, Volunteer Service Medal and the African Service Medal. She served on five hospital ships toward the end of the war then became an Industrial nurse with Christie Bread. She leaves her sister Jewel McKerr, nephew Craig (Lynda) McKerr, niece Elouise (Tom) Perry, and great nieces and nephews. She was buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Toronto, beside her Dad and Mother.

Her Dad, Rev. Kenneth C. MacLennan was born in Inverness, Scotland, 1882-1972. He attended Glasgow Bible Training Institute. After coming to Canada, he graduated in 1919 from Pinehill College Institute, Halifax, N.S. During the Halifax explosion of 1917, he worked with the rescue teams. From 1921 to 1927, he served various Free Churches in Scotland, then returned to this country. In Montreal, he became senior minister with Kydd Memorial Church, then served in Ontario in Creemore, Port Elgin, Westminster in Toronto, Fingal and Port Sydney before retiring in 1952. A year later he was appointed stated supply at Pickering and ministered there for five years. His wife, Louisa Jenkins MacLennan was born in Fort Augustus, Scotland, 1878 - 1974. They had two daughters, Jewel and Ruth.

From the Editor

Robin MacLennan - September 2004

The following newsletter is a brief overview to let you know what has been happening since Fergus 2004.

We have heard that Chief Ruairidh, Kirsteen and Lorna can visit for about a week in August, so we can start planning.

Here are short accounts of what we found at the various Games we attended :

Kincardine- Karen Dunbabin had her first foray as a rep. and had purchased a canopy. Unfortunately, some poles were missing from the package so she was delayed in setting up. There were very few Clans represented only later did she find out that the Clans do not set up on Sunday. She had gone through the names of people with our surname in the phone book before and did make a couple of contacts at the Games, but also heard that some others had prior arrangements. The Games, as such, were not very big and a more fruitful target might be during the band marches through the town, which take place reasonably frequently and are usually well attended. We will check this with Flora for next year.

Maxville- Eileen and I left Ottawa in the rain which continued until about 12.30. They managed to get the dance competitions in but the massed bands at the end had to be cancelled-it turned black again! Anyway, we saw Marilyn Lawler, Finlay and Rory Angus, as well as poet Rob. Finlay said Wee Donald is holding his own but both he and Dorothy can't get around much and even find carrying on a long conversation tiring. Understandably, we didn't manage to sell much, although we probably did better than the Concessions outside. We also saw Mabell in Ottawa and she is fine.

Fergus- This was perfect weather- sunny but not too hot, with only a five minute shower on Friday evening. The Tattoo went over time, as usual, and it was a wee bit chilly for August, so Eileen and I had Clan sweaters on as well as our kilts for the Lichtin. There were a lot of visitors at the tent and we mustered a goodly number for the Parade-even the commentator remarked on our numbers. The honoured clans this year were the Frasers and the Keiths, both being represented by their Chiefs. There was a massed bands show not long after the Parade this could be a good time to see them instead of waiting until 5.30. We had our AGM on the grounds see separate report.

We went to a new place Horizons, for dinner with 23 attending. Although we were spread around six tables, they were close enough to constitute a party. The meal was great, the service fast and cheery and the portions huge. Eileen ordered a Seniors portion, which was more than ample but cost much less. We even managed to complete the draw (Jean won the brick for Lois) and a wide variety of prizes were distributed before the closing time of 8 p.m. A most successful evening with our new members, Dr. John

A most enjoyable Games, with a beautiful day, good attendance and everything going according to plan. We hope more members will make it next year because it will be the 20th year for the COB, the 60th year for the Fergus Games and our Chief is coming.

Almonte also had a sunny day. These Games are on a smaller scale than Fergus but have a beautiful setting rather like Victoria Park Eileen was surprised to meet Ghislaine and Bill there I think they felt that Maxville was an expensive washout as they had bought advanced tickets. No other members appeared but there were a few visitors. The sun is certainly welcome there as any shelter is hard to find if it rains.

Highlights from the AGM

- We had 18 at the meeting (14 last year)
- The 2003 AGM minutes and the Financial Statement to August 12,2004 were presented and approved. This Statement is included in this letter with a current update.
- A questionnaire was suggested for members to put forward ideas on the direction of future activities for the Clan, because the proposed workshop had to be cancelled.
- Our financial year, which used to end on May 31, is being moved to July 31. The May date reflected the start of the COB but moving the AGM to the Fergus Games has caused problems with dues. Starting next year, current memberships for 2004-2005 will expire on July 31,2005 and should be renewed at or before the AGM.
- New membership - \$25 with renewals \$10. If members do not renew for two years they will be sent a separate reminder. If this is not answered, their names will be deleted from the directory and re-admission will be treated as a new membership.
- We have heard that Chief Ruairidh's e-mail has been out of commission for quite some time. His new email is chiefruairidh@aol.com.
- He has changed employers and, as he has to do two weeks army service per year his holiday time is restricted.
- Requests for changes to the directory will be included in each newsletter. New member names will be sent on a separate sheet to make it easier to add to the directory.
- New committee members are urgently needed because Harold & Evelyn and Dr. Bill & Mona are retiring.
