FROM THE PRESIDENT

Members are invited to join us in the Parade at 12.00, when the games officially open. Kilts are NOT required, but a Clan shirt or some item of MacLennan tartan will help to show your colours. Please dress comfortably, because it is meant to be a fun day for everybody. You can even get to carry one of the banners, which Bob assembled, each showing recognized versions of our tartan. If you are coming to the dinner, please let us know at the tent, so we can advise the Angel Diner of our numbers.

The Tattoo on Friday night is well worth a visit, but it tends to go on until about 10.30, which is not good if you have a long drive home. If you are staying in Fergus, the shuttle bus is useful- it runs every 20 minutes and picks up at about 5-6 places indicated by board on the sidewalk. They make a point of ensuring they pick up all from the Tattoo!

CLAN GATHERING, EDINBURGH, 24-26 JULY, 2009

If you hope to go but have not applied yet, do it now or you may be disappointed.

Passports – these are required entry for all events and guarantee places. Book at www.thegathering2009.com with method of payment ready. Gold passports have sold out, but silver and bronze are available, differences being in the quality of viewing of the parade, Highland Games etc.

Accommodation- Our Clan base will be the Express by Holiday Inn, Edinburgh. Book at www.casheltravel.com with your passport. They have silver and bronze rooms still available and apparently can also book passports.

Our tent has been to Georgetown and Cobourg so far this year. Georgetown appeared larger than last year, with about twenty Clan tents, more dancers and a good turnout for the massed bands. This venue seems to be getting more popular, possibly due to Hamilton canceling out again. Cobourg, however, had separate venues for the Games and their Festival, which divided the attendance. I hope they are not following Fort Erie, who have dropped the Games in favour of a Festival only. We will be at the Glengarry Games at Maxville the week before Fergus.

Peacefully at McMaster University Medical Centre on May 17th, 2008, in her 79th year. Lois was recently predeceased by her beloved husband Wendell, and deeply cherished by her daughter Wendy Elliott, son Terry (Susan), granddaughter Jessica Regan (Todd), and sister Jean Rose and family.

Well respected as a caring and committed person, Lois served her community as a volunteer for the Cancer Society, Kidney Foundation and Salvation Army; as a Church Elder and webmaster; and for 16 years as Director of the Hamilton-Wentworth Home Care Program.

Before her retirement in 1989, she had also been President of the Association of Home Care Administrators, President of the Zonta Club of Hamilton 1, and Commissioner and Area Training Chairperson for the Girl Guides.

She was a graduate of McMaster University, University of Toronto, and Hamilton General Hospital (Class of 1951 B). Family History - Sharing the Past By: David MacLennan

Article 7 – Research Using Modern Scientific Techniques - More about DNA

After the last article concerning the use of DNA Studies as a research tool, I received a number of emails from MacLennan researchers inquiring about a group project for the CLAN MACLENNAN. Two of these email messages have indicated an interest in setting up an administrative team for a Clan Mc/MacLennan Genographic Group Project. As previously mentioned, there are only two registered Mc/MacLennan members within the Genographic Project, my son Matthew and the gentleman that I spoke of in the last article. My intent is to get involved on co-administering or any way possible to help this group out.

The following excerpt from Ancestry.com will give you a number of topics that helps to understand what this all means.

- What can DNA do for me?

You might already be familiar with how DNA testing can help solve crimes, confirm the paternity of children, and even determine the identity of ancient mummies.
